

### History

- Fence and forage damage claims and payments had always been a source of contention between landowners and CPW.
- Historical landowner frustration over big game herd management and size.
- Bad winter of 1983/84 created many problems between big game and private landowners.
- During 1988/89, legislation considered that would make DOW liable for all private land forage damage.
- Outcome: HPP Program Started


### History

- HPP initially set up to deal only with Fence and Forage problems.
- ◆In 2002, statutes changed that broadened HPP's purpose to:




### 33-1-110 (8a) CRS


- "reduce wildlife conflicts, particularly those associated with forage and fence issues and to assist the Division of Wildlife in meeting game management objectives through duties as deemed appropriate by the Director".
- HPP still focused on big game/ag conflicts.





### Funding The HPP program receives 5% of deer, elk, pronghorn, moose license fees from those areas that have local HPP committees. Money not spent in a FY remains in the HPP fund for future projects. (subject to cap) Continuously Appropriated





### How Does HPP Work?

- Commission approved 10 year operating plan authorizes spending state money for approved activities
- Local committees solicit, review, approve, fund and evaluate projects
- Projects must be focused on big game/agricultural conflicts
- Projects need to show partnerships.

# HPP Project Information HPP is intended to assist private landowners with big game conflicts. Projects can be undertaken wherever they would effectively address the problem and reduce or resolve conflicts - on private or public property. Projects emphasize partnerships and leveraging of money Projects look to both short term fixes and long term solutions












